ADMISSIONS

For fall 2019, 9% of 6272 applicants were offered admission. 56% of those accepted matriculated. 1037 applicants were placed on the waiting list. 25 from the waiting list matriculated.

Sat & Act test results must be received by January 31.

Early Action/Early Decision:

School DOES NOT have an early action program. School has a formalized early decision program with a deadline of November 1. They received 771 early decision applications. 193 early decision applicants were accepted with 25% accepting the offer.
